Noah's Inclusion Services uses a Key Worker Model for children six years and under, led by a team of skilled and experienced Key Workers with specialist understanding of early childhood intervention.

Your child's Key Worker will become the person you see and talk to the most at Noah's. That doesn't mean they are the only person deciding what therapy will work best for your child though - they represent the expertise and input of the wider Noah's team.

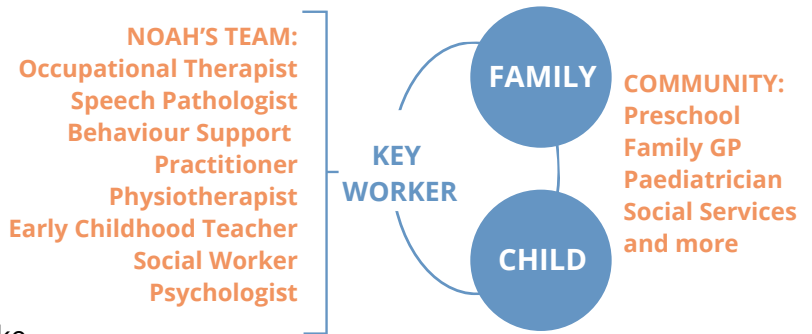
Your Key Worker will organise the services you receive from Noah's and coordinate the team who support your child and family. Although it sounds like your Key Worker will become the expert on your child's needs, the expert is YOU, as you know what is best for your child and have the greatest impact on their development.

Most parents are busy and finding the time to take their child to lots of different therapist appointments can be challenging. One of the greatest benefits of the Key Worker Model is that these multiple appointments are minimised and replaced with a partnership with your Key Worker focussing on what works best for your child and drawing on the expertise of other professionals as needed.

Another benefit of the Key Worker Model is that sessions are usually held in the family home where the child spends most of their time. This is not only convenient for families, it also means that the child and parent/carer are usually comfortable and relaxed which makes the session much more effective.

Noah's follows the Early Childhood Intervention Australia (ECIA) Best-Practice Guidelines which are proven to have positive outcomes for children and families.
